

Healthy Neighborhood, Healthy Families Initiative: Treating the Neighborhood as Patient

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OVERVIEW

PURPOSE

To improve the health outcomes of children and families in a scalable model via a place-based initiative that treats "the neighborhood as patient".

PROBLEM

- Concentrated poverty
- Violence
- Failing schools and childcare
- Low social cohesion
- High medical utilization rates
- Housing Instability

POPULATION

- A 31-block area (home to 4,300 people)
- 1,000 children, half of whom live below federal poverty level
- Blight, with vacancy peaking at 30% of housing units

INTERVENTIONS

HEALTH AND WELLNESS

- School-based clinics saw more than 1.200 visits
- School-based behavioral health effort saw more than 300 visits
- Good Behavior Game for K-2 grades
- Signs of Suicide Screening for high school students and teachers

- 20% decline in ED visits
- 12.7% decline in probability of in-patient admission
- · Teen pregnancies down

EDUCATION

- 200 Nationwide Children's Hospital employee mentors/yr in local
- **SPARK** literacy program prepared 350 parents/children for kindergarten
- 6 child care teacher fellowships per year

• Kindergarten readiness increased from 32% to 96% for **SPARK** children

OUTCOMES

- Reduced grade school suspensions/expulsions 15%
- High school graduation rates increased from 64% to 79%
- 60 high school students joined Upward Bound STEM



WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

- · Nationwide Children's Hospital increased wages to at least \$15/hr
- The hospital hired more than 180 neighborhood residents per year
- Increased average retention rate for neighborhood employees



AFFORDABLE HOUSING

- \$80 million invested by Nationwide Children's Hospital and partners
- Built first Land Trust properties for long term affordability in Columbus
- Affordable for households at 43% of average median income

• Goodwill Ready to Work Bootcamp for Southside residents

• Career Gateway: 58-unit complex with onsite career training

• Fannie Mae 500: Recruit and train 500 for healthcare jobs

Vacancies fell 75%

- 775 affordable housing units built, renovated or under contract
- 3 straight years of increased resident satisfaction
